




WELCOME TO WARNER PARKS

The iconic landscape of the Warner Parks is defined by the rolling hills, ridges, and valleys remnant of the surrounding Highland Rim. Located in the Nashville Basin, the Parks are characterized by a rich, deciduous urban forest, primarily oak-hickory and beech-maple forest types with moss-covered limestone outcroppings scattered throughout. This beloved urban forest, just miles away from an expanding metropolis, offers protected sanctuary for hundreds of species of native flora and fauna.

Since 1927, the Warner Parks have provided peaceful refuge for relaxation, reflection, wildlife viewing, hiking, biking, running, and many other responsible recreational pursuits here in Nashville. We encourage visitors to adopt an appreciation and respect for the natural wonders of the Warner Parks while visiting.



THE BURCH RESERVE

In 2004, Friends of Warner Parks embraced an opportunity to acquire additional land and expand the Warner Parks footprint. In partnership with Metro Parks and thanks to the generosity of the Lucius E. Burch III family and others, nearly 500 scenic acres, including a State Designated Natural Area, were added to Edwin Warner Park. This extraordinary initiative ensures that these natural habitats and undisturbed vistas are forever protected from commercial development.

The Burch Reserve is a unique and fragile natural area that has special regulations in place. **For this reason, the Burch Reserve is open from dawn to dusk, and dogs and trail running are prohibited.**



VISITOR RESPONSIBILITIES

The Warner Parks contain primitive trails, paved multi-use trails, dual-use horse and pedestrian trails, roads, horse trails, and mountain bike trails. Please show courtesy to other trail users and follow the rules of your trail type.

- Do not remove plants or disturb wildlife
- Dispose of trash in provided receptacles
- Stay on designated trails – shortcuts cause damage
- Keep pets on a leash not exceeding six feet
- Keep to the right, pass on the left and give an audible signal when passing
- Cyclists may ride on paved surfaces and designated mountain bike trails only
- Cyclists may not exceed 20 MPH
- Cyclists must yield to pedestrians
- Pedestrians are prohibited on horse-only trails and mountain bike trails
- Pedestrians must yield to horses
- Dogs, bikes, and trail running are prohibited on dual-use horse and pedestrian trails

PROHIBITED

- Drugs
- Hunting
- Alcohol
- Fires outside of designated areas

- Take car keys with you
