

Why Certify Your Native Habitat?

Educate Yourself: Learn about the necessary elements for creating a native habitat to support the intended goals of the specific certification.

Educate Others: Inspire neighbors and community members by showcasing the impact of native gardening and habitat restoration.

Support: Contribute to the mission of the sponsoring organization through your certification fee and the purchase of a yard sign.

Recognition: Establish credibility if certain neighbors are critical or making complaints about your yard.

Read through these local and national certification options; explore our native plant sources and make a plan!


LOCAL CERTIFICATIONS

The Habitat Connection Certified Bird Sanctuary



This program is focused on helping small property owners in the Nashville and Franklin areas understand the native plants and other habitat elements birds need to survive and thrive in Middle TN.

The certification process includes a personalized, two-hour on-site consultation, an in-depth recommendations report, and ongoing support to help you complete certification.





Certified Arboretum

The Certified Arboretum is for properties with at least thirty different species of well-maintained trees, open to the public and proactively utilized for experiential education about trees and the important role they play in communities.

Certified Tree Sanctuary

The Certified Tree Sanctuary is for homeowners who want their property to inspire family, friends, and neighbors through exemplary tree stewardship with at least ten different species of trees.

Tennessee Smart Yards



A program that guides Tennesseans on practices they can apply in their outdoor spaces to create healthier, more ecologicallysound landscapes and communities.

Nine principles of stewardship serve as the foundation for the program and are explored in online modules and practical workshops taught by UT-TSU Extension and water resource professionals.

The goal is to make your yard better for the environment and to act like a sponge to soak up water.





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NATIONAL CERTIFICATIONS

National Wildlife Federation Certified Wildlife Habitat

Everyone can enjoy and protect wildlife where they live, learn, work, play, and worship.

This program provides simple steps and a wealth of resources to create beautiful spaces that make a big impact for local and migratory species from small window boxes to vast habitat corridors.

Wild Ones Certified Native Habitat

Certifying your native habitat and displaying a Certified Native Habitat Sign is a step towards connecting with a community of like-minded individuals who are making a real difference.

To certify, you must be a member of Wild Ones and pledge to work towards 75% native habitat.

International Hummingbird Society Certified Hummingbird Garden

Show your support for local and migrating hummingbirds, and turn your garden into a Certified Hummingbird Haven.

Anyone can transform their garden into a haven that provides local and migrating hummingbirds with food, water, sanctuary and an eco-friendly environment.

North American Butterfly Association

Certified Butterfly Garden

We can all make a positive impact on butterflies regardless of where we live.

Local butterfly gardens of all shapes and sizes are critical to creating habitat that supports these crucial pollinators.

Add native nectar and caterpillar food plants to your garden to help butterflies survive and thrive!

Monarch WayStation

Create a Monarch WayStation to help assure the preservation of Monarch butterflies and the continuation of the spectacular Monarch migration phenomenon.

Creating a Monarch Waystation can be as simple as adding milkweeds and nectar sources to existing gardens or maintaining natural habitats with milkweeds.

No effort is too small to have a positive impact.

Homegrown National Park Get on the Map

Getting on the Homegrown National Park Biodiversity Map showcases your commitment to restoring nature and inspires others to take action.

By adding your space, you contribute to a growing movement that regenerates biodiversity and strengthens local ecosystems.

Support parks that focus on habitat conservation or ecosystem restoration

Query the NNPS Facebook Group for specific opportunities to donate time or money to a local park or organization

Replace an invasive plant in your yard/community with a native plant

Check out the resource pages to learn more about plants native to Tennessee and where to purchase native plants

Share knowledge about invasive & native plants with your HOA/community

Write an article for your HOA newsletter; create a presentation for an HOA member meeting; coordinate an invasive pull

Work with your HOA to encourage and allow more native plant landscaping

Push for incentives for HOA homeowners who use native plants and read Top 10 Ways **HOAs Can Support Birds** and Butterflies

Create a Trade-A-Tree Program

Work with a local utility such as Metro Water Services to initiate this type of program in Nashville

Support a local nursery that grows native plants

What is Rewilding?

Rewilding is the restoration of native plants and natural processes to support biodiversity, ecosystem health, and wildlife resilience.

How to rewild in your community?

Expand native plantings and gardens in your own yard or volunteer to assist with a community re-wilding project



Tips to Get Started

Propagate or start a pollinator garden from native seeds

Purchase seed mixes from the **Tennessee Environmental Council's "Generate Some Buzz"** program or choose specific flowering seeds from **Plant for a Change**



Sign-up and support local native plant initiatives!

Participate in local initiatives like **Neighbors 4 Native Plants** that offers twice-yearly pollinator kits tailored to your yard

Keep abreast of local native plant sales and festivals across the state

Join the NNPS Facebook or Rewild Nashville, or sign-up for newsletters from organizations like Wild Ones Middle Tennessee or TN Smart Yards Learn about local native trees, shrubs, vines and herbaceous plants

Explore a **detailed list of native trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants** that support butterflies and moths in Davidson County

Increase native plants in your yard by adding native trees, shrubs or wildflowers

Purchase native plants from local nurseries like **Wonder Gift and Garden** and **GroWild Inc** or get landscape design help from **Habitat Landcapes** and other organizations

Organize or participate in a community native plant volunteer project or help maintain a local native plant garden! Explore volunteer opportunities with local organizations like **Friends of Warner Parks** or **Tennessee Environmental Council** or **Second Sunday Gardeners**



Educating Yourself and Others

Educate yourself first! Read books like Bringing Nature Home, or The Humane Gardener, subscribe to a Native Plant newsletter, take an in-person or online native plant course through the TN Naturalist Program, sign up for walks and programs at your nearest Nature Center, and use plant ID apps like iNaturalist or Seek

Tips to Get Started

Raise awareness through social media

Join a Facebook group like Nashville Native Plant Symposium, Wild Ones Middle TN Discussion or **Homegrown National Park** and share activities

Research and share tips for avoiding pesticides and herbicides

Read and share resources such as the Xerces Society Herbicide Fact Sheet or Reducing Pesticide Use, or learn about the Mosquito **Bucket of Doom**

Reach out to local news outlets to raise awareness

Contact local media outlets (WPLN, Nashville Banner, TN Wild Side, WNPT) about featuring a native plant story or community initiative

Learn & share information about invasive plants

Download Tennessee Invasive Plant Councils' Invasive Plant Primer for the Home Landscape to learn about identifying and controling common TN invasives
